CREATING THE LITERARY ARTS MAGAZINE

In this course we will explore the literature, philosophy and practice of literary magazines. We will discuss such topics as: Editorial Perspectives; Online versus Print Publications; and Defining Your Magazine/Defining Your Audience. After developing a funding, marketing and distribution plan, students will essentially create their own literary arts magazine – from conception to final layout. Prerequisite: ENG 120.
